

GPL technical assistance advances implementation of innovative practices through hands-on project support



GPL criminal justice projects test model approaches in 911 triage, early diversion, bail reform, service navigation, violence prevention, and pre-trial supervision to reduce reliance on local criminal justice systems.

GPL technical assistance helps jurisdictions:

- Increase capacity of busy staff through targeted support
- Design and implement tools, policy, and protocols that support desired systems change
- Identify key metrics that provide insight into whether reforms are working
- Scale up adoption of successful reforms across jurisdiction
- Connect and share learning and successes with peer jurisdictions

Nationally, jurisdictions are exploring new 911 response models that offer alternatives to traditional dispatch options


A significant portion of 911 calls are related to quality-of-life and other low-priority incidents that may require a timesensitive response but are better suited for unarmed responders

There is a national call to action for jurisdictions to move away from police as de-facto response by investing in strengthened response systems that create more equitable outcomes

Alternative dispatch models divert 911 calls to community-based, health-centered response teams equipped to offer connection to supportive services

Jurisdictions need targeted implementation support to sustain the impact of new alternative 911 emergency response teams

GPL cohort TA will include: 12 months of real-time coaching to cities/counties launching or expanding alternative response teams through individualized program development support, access to adaptable implementation template materials, and facilitated peer learning on key decision points.



TA Goals: enhance jurisdiction capacity to maintain momentum & advance implementation

GPL TA spotlight: Harris County, TX Holistic Assistance Response Team (HART)

Examples of GPL-supported planning deliverables

- ✓ Convened law enforcement, mental health, and county executive stakeholder work group
- ✓ Established pilot program outcome and performance metrics
- ✓ Analyzed county 911 call response data to identify eligible call codes and screening criteria
- ✓ Developed working HART budget proposal used to secure \$5 million county budget allocation
- ✓ Co-wrote RFP soliciting community social service providers to staff response teams

"It was critical to have a strong partner like the GPL to keep the momentum of our alternative response team project. With the GPL's help, we seamlessly coordinated across county stakeholders who had not worked together before and dove into call for service data. Their support helped us quickly estimate eligible calls from a complicated dispatch system, analyze potential program impact, and identify promising pilot locations."

What kind of jurisdictions should apply?

- ✓ Jurisdictions that are committed to taking clear steps and making investments to launch or expand within 12 months of cohort start.
- ✓ Jurisdictions who can designate a TA point of contact who is directly involved in program implementation and decision making and is available for up to 4 hours/week for cohort participation. (Note: this is 4 hours of GPL-facing time, not including other time spent on program development.)

If you are unsure if your jurisdiction is within 12 months of clear steps and investments, still apply and tell us what would be helpful in getting from where you are now to the next step toward implementation.

GPL Alternative 911 Emergency Response Cohort: TA Application Round 1 due May 28, 2021

- Who should apply: Any city or county jurisdiction that is committed to actively piloting, or is within a year of launching, an alternative 911 emergency response team of trained unarmed responders to handle 911 calls.
- How to apply: Complete and submit a <u>first-round application</u> by the end of day on Friday, May 28, 2021. The application should take no more than an hour to complete.
- Materials needed for application: Understanding of available 911 responses, access to project planning materials, project timeline, names of stakeholders involved in implementation planning

Round 2 Interviews

- We will also **cover specific MOU and letter of support details** during your Round 2 phone/Zoom conversations. Jurisdictions will be asked to verbally confirm their ability to sign a Harvard MOU and provide letters of support from jurisdiction leadership as part of consideration for final selection.
